LPNA Business

- Recent LPNA Accomplishments:

BeautifySJ Grant Update

- The 2024 Grant was applied for. The \$5,000 request has not been awarded yet. Will cover NNO, social events and improved bulletin board in Los Paseos Park.
- Existing \$5,000 grants ends March 31. Covered street tree project, planting four trees in the neighborhood. Our City Forest helped implement and helped volunteers with planting.

Los Paseos Park Update

- The ten trees planted a year ago are budding. Watering will resume as the rain decreases.
- Trees were inspected, pruned and the bark cleaned up March 13.
- The Pruning session help in January with Our City Forest was effective.
- Native Plant Garden is starting spring bloom.

Paseo #2 Court SignPosts Update

• Greg has completed and installed signposts in paseos #2. Greg mentioned that people have commented on how helpful and nice the signposts are.

• Great American Litter Pick Up, April 20

 LPNA and D10 leadership will join the national clean-up effort on April 20. Details to be announced ASAP.

Bernal Way Wall

 The height extension is complete. Greg mentioned that LPNA would like to keep the wall looking good with an occasional clear wood finish application. Michelle Dexter stated that the D10 office could provide some funding for this—

Congressman Jimmy Panetta

- Congressman Panetta represents Congressional District 19, one of the largest including much of San Jose, Monterey, Santa Cruz, Cambria, and Kern County. He says his district encompasses everything from computer chips to cow chips.
- His priorities include legislation on the federal level to fund local projects; case-work involving the
 issues his constituents might have with government programs (IRS, Social Security, Medicare,
 Veterans issues, etc.) He also spoke of protecting the beauty of the area and our responsibility to
 preserve open space and support agriculture in balance.
- Panetta is on the Ways and Means Committee, including VA Clinics, military bases including bases in Monterey (including the Defense Language Institute and Ft. Hunter Leggitt) and all armed services issues.
- Panetta is also focusing on housing, including low- and middle-income tax credits, increased tax breaks for renters, potential changes to capital gains laws, and first-time home buyer tax credits.
- Residents are welcome to call or email his office and are promised a response. Panetta has offices in Paso Robles, Monterey, Santa Cruz and on Blossom Hill Road in San Jose.
- Herb mentioned a few issues with D2 having issues with railroad easements, Lake Cunningham, and Almaden Lake cleanup efforts. Panetta said he would work with the City of SJ to assess the issues, ask the right questions and figure out what tasks need to be addressed.

Councilmember Arjun Batra, D10

- Councilmember Batra thanked LPNA for the many projects and events held in the past.
- He talked about the Mayor's Budget Message (presented March 11 and due to be finalized in June)
 and reaffirmed the mayor's priorities including reducing the number of San Jose unsheltered
 residents, increasing community safety, cleaning up our neighborhoods, attracting investments,
 and adding jobs and housing.

- Batra mentioned that based on the lessons learned last year, the approach will be different.
- He suggested quick builds including manufactured homes, insulated containers, and additional sites for the approximately 4,600 homeless in SJ and about 800 people living in RVs.
- Upcoming events include:

SJPD Captain Steve Donohue

- Captain Donohue reported that our area was quiet this quarter with one robbery, one aggravated assault and one injury accident.
- Captain Donohue also addressed the redistricting proposal, having sent it back with comments
 concerning staffing numbers, shift changes and locations. He also mentioned that removing
 "beats" might work to increase response time. Police working in teams, sharing workloads to get
 things resolved faster.
- He mentioned that Los Paseos is a "low crime" area.
- He discussed scanners and the complaints neighbors have that police radio communications must be encrypted under the federal law on privacy and scanners cannot receive the transmission. This initiative, Donohue says, creates a safer environment for officers as now privacy concerns are addressed, and personal information is more secure.
- Captain Donohue also emphasized that people please report crimes and concerns to the police department, not just on NextDoor.

Gavin Comstock, Santa Clara County Open Space Authority

- Comstock discussed the opening of the new Mayyan Ooyakma in the Coyote Ridge Open Space Preserve. Mayyan Ooyakma is a 1,859-acre property.
- Serpentine-dependent species include the federally threatened Bay Checkerspot Butterfly and the federally endangered Metcalf Canyon jewelflower.
- The Mayyan Ooyakma preserve is open 7 days a week, year-round while the Habitat Protection Area is open Wednesday-Sunday.
- Docent-led hikes are available in March, April and May with reservations required.
- The Habitat Protection Area operates on a Butterfly Access System. Passes are free and can be obtained on their website. 10 AM is the best butterfly viewing.
- Open Space Authority hosts Volunteer Orientation monthly and Interpretive Host Training quarterly.
- April 20 Earth Day Celebration, visit the website at www.openspaceauthority.org for additional information.
- Comstock also discussed the wildlife corridors in the news lately. Coyote Valley is a natural wildlife
 corridor with a variety of natural culverts on 101 by the golf course. The Open Space Authority is
 working with local agencies to establish safety corridors along Monterey Highway. Community
 meetings will be announced.
